Explanation

The abstracts and transcriptions of Albritton records in early Georgia presented below help to document the immigration of the children and grandchildren of James Albritton Sr. (1705–c1773) from Pitt County, North Carolina into Georgia beginning in 1785. Two of James' younger sons, George and Richard Albritton, settled in two of Georgia's original counties, Burke and Effingham, in the 1780s. They moved there with their nephew, John Albritton, and they expanded into Bulloch, Jefferson, and Screven Counties. Beginning in about 1798, additional grandsons of James Albritton Sr. immigrated to Georgia from Pitt County, North Carolina, including Zachariah, Enoch, and others.

Several decades later, in the 1830s, additional descendants of James Albritton immigrated to Georgia, namely children of his grandson, Joel Albritton. They settled in Sumter and Muscogee Counties, Georgia.

These abstracts and not intended as an encyclopedic listing of all Albritton records in early Georgia. Rather, these notes focus upon the known descendants of James Albritton Sr. of Pitt County, North Carolina and their associates.

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Abstracts of Selected Albritton Records from Georgia

For £10, Richard Albritton, planter, sells to Wharton Vaughter, planter, both of Effingham County, Georgia, a 26 Dec 1792 tract of 100 acres of land in Effingham County, Georgia, part of a 200-acre grant made to Richard Albritton on 15 January 1785, described as ...on the East side of Horse Creek...beginning at the crooked run in the No. east line thence S70E to corner thence S20W25 to corner thence N33W40 to corner on Horse Creek thence up the said Creek to the mouth of little Horse and thence a direct course to the beginning butting and bounding or near lands of Samuel Furin... Witnesses: Beniⁿ Richardson I.P. Reference: Effingham County GA Deed and Mortgage Record Book C–D, pp. 5–6. The clerk indicated that Richard Albritton signed his name to the transaction. 7 Feb 1796 For "the Sum of thirty pounds Sterling," Lewis Moore, planter, sells Richard Albritton, planter, both of "Scriven" County, Georgia, a tract of 200 acres of land in "Scriven" County, Georgia ...bounded northly by lands of **Thoms** South east by **Lewis** and on all other sides by vacant Land at the time of Survey... Samuel Thornton [his mark], Neomy Thornton [her mark], Poly Albritton [her mark] Witnesses: Bulloch County GA Deed Book AA, p. 144. The clerk indicated that Lewis Moore signed the document, whereas Reference: Charity Moore, Lewis' wife, made her mark to it. The identity of "Poly" Albritton is unclear, but Polly is presumably a nickname for Richard's wife, believed to be Comment: Mary Albritton. Based upon a warrant dated 3 September 1798, R. D. Gray surveyed a tract of 240 acres of pine land in Jefferson Sept 1798 County for Zachery "Albrittain" on September 6th. His land adjoined that of Jas. Young, B. Jackson, Wm. Young, John Farmer, Wm. Matthews, and Ezekiel Akridge, Esqr. Chain Carriers: Ruel Evans, Geo. "Albrittain" Jefferson County GA Land Plat Book 1-4 (1796-1836), p. 45, #109. Reference: Although the survey was for 240 acres, the State of Georgia granted Albritton a tract of 200 acres in 1800. The Comment: survey included a plat of the land, showing a small sliver of land extending out and curving between two existing landowners. It would appear that this portion was removed from Albritton's grant before it was issued (Georgia Land Grant Book CCCCC. p. 574). For \$100, John Lanier, planter, sells Richard Albritton, planter, both of Bulloch County, Georgia, a tract of 150 12 Dec 1798 acres of land in Bulloch County, Georgia ...on the South Side of Great Ogechee River Bounded north by Ogechee River East by F. Nicholds South by Samuel Lanier's on all other sides by vacant land ... John Albritton J.P., Richard Albritton Witnesses: Bulloch County GA Deed Book AA, pp. 144-145. John and Richard Albritton also witnessed the receipt that John Reference: Lanier signed, acknowledging receipt of the \$100 from Richard Albritton. John Albritton had both an uncle and son by the name of "Richard Albritton." His son had only recently reached Comment: adulthood. We presume that the elder Richard is the one purchasing the 150 acres, with the transaction witnessed by his nephew and great-nephew, John and Richard Albritton. John Lanier is possibly the identical man by this name who formerly resided near the Albrittons in Pitt County, North Carolina. <u>1798</u> "General List of Slaves Owned, Or superintended On the first day of October 1798, within the second assessment Division, Being within the County of Burke, In the State of Georgia." Comment:	It is believed that both Lanier and Matthew Albritton Sr. are sons of George Albritton, son of James Albritton Sr. It is unclear why George was not listed, but presumably, he lived in a different district and that assessment does not exist.

Comment:	Although his name was recorded here as <i>"Alberton,"</i> given that Richard Albritton lived on the farm that adjoined Elisha Fowler Banks (see Albritton's land purchase made in 1807) and Sarah Banks, mentioned as his administrator in 1799 (same reference here, p. 10), this man was clearly Richard Albritton, apparently also a justice of the peace to justify his <i>"esquire"</i> moniker. Banks' full name was <i>"Elisha Fowler Banks,"</i> as given in a return made in 1803 (p. 40, 46, 87).
<u>7 Feb 1801</u>	For \$75, John Wright sells John Albritton , both of Bulloch County, Georgia, a tract of 400 acres of land known by the name of Ruferds Cowpen tract Convey [sic] to the said John Wright by Andrew Burney & Mary his wife heirs of said Ruferd by a deed of Conveyance and by said Wright Conveyed to said John Albritton

Comment:	James Albritton is believed to be the son of Richard Albritton and the grandson of James Albritton Sr.
<u>13 Dec 1801</u>	For "the Sum of five pounds Sterling," Richard Albritton , planter, sells to John Richardson , planter, both of Bulloch County, Georgia, a tract of 100 acres of land "lying on Sculls Creek granted to Richard Albritton adjoining Bryans on all sides."
Witnesses:	James Albritton, Lany Albritton [her mark]
Reference:	Bulloch County GA Deed Book A, p. 54b. The clerk indicated that Richard Albritton signed his name to the document. The date written at the beginning of the document was December 13 th , but at the end of the document, it stated that Richard signed it on December 16 th . On December 26 th , James Albritton appeared in court and signed a sworn statement that,
	he saw Richard Albritton Assign Seal and deliver the within deed unto John Richardson and that he Subscribed his name as a witness to the sam [sic-same] and that he saw Lany Do [meaning "ditto"] his wife Subscribe her name with him as a witness.
Comment:	James and Lany had only married the previous month. James is the son of Richard Albritton and grandson of James Albritton Sr. Although James' first cousin, John Albritton, had a son by the name of <i>"Richard Albritton"</i> who was then of legal age, the younger man was not known to yet own land. The man making this sale is believed to be the older Richard, son of James Albritton Sr.
<u>1801</u>	In Jefferson County, Georgia, "Zacry Albriton" paid taxes of 45ϕ on one white poll and 200 acres of pine land drained by the Ogeechee River in Jefferson County, adjoined land of David Wood, originally granted to David Wood, and his land valued at \$45.

Comment:	Zachariah Albritton is apparently the son of Matthew Albritton and grandson of James Albritton Sr. Zachariah received a 200-acre grant of land in Jefferson from the State of Georgia in 1800, so it is unclear if the statement on the tax record that his land was originally granted to David Wood is a mistake, or if Albritton sold the land he was granted and purchased another 200 acres from Wood between 1800 and 1801.
<u>17 Feb 1802</u>	Richard Albritton receives a license to marry Marget Kent in Bulloch County, Georgia.

<u>1802-1803</u>	In Jefferson County, Georgia, "Zachariah Albritton" paid taxes of $46^{1}\!\!/4\phi$ on one white poll and 200 acres of pine land drained by the Ogeechee River in Jefferson County, adjoined land of David Wood, and originally granted to David Wood.

Comment: Between 1803 and 1804, Zachariah Albritton left Jefferson County, for he did not pay 1804 taxes.

The 1805 Georgia Land Lottery dispersed lands to white settlers ceded to the State of Georgia by the Creek Indians in 1802 and 1805.

1805 Georgia Land Lottery Albritton Registrants

Comments:

s: All of the Albritton registrants for the 1805 Georgia Land Lottery except the two in Elbert are descendants of James Albritton Sr. of Pitt County, North Carolina:

- George in Burke and Richard in Effingham are two of the three younger sons of James Albritton Sr.
- Matthew and Lanier in Burke and George in Screven are sons of George Albritton Sr.
- John in Bulloch is the son of Thomas Albritton, the eldest son of James Albritton Sr.
- Matthew, Richard, and Thomas in Bulloch are sons of John Albritton (grandson of James Albritton Sr.).
- William in Washington is the son of Peter Albritton Sr., the fourth son of James Albritton Sr.
- Zacra Albritton of Jefferson is believed to be the son of Capt. Matthew Albritton, the third son of James Albritton Sr.
- John Albritton Sr. of Elbert is not a descendant of James Albritton Sr. John of Elbert was born in Virginia and performed military service for the Patriots during the American Revolution. He later received a pension for his military service and lived until 1836. He is often erroneously confused with John Albritton of Bulloch County, who later moved to Laurens and died there in 1815. Presumably, John M. Albritton of Elbert is his son.

1805–1806 In Jefferson County, Georgia, "Verity Farmer" paid taxes of 31½¢ on one white poll.

Comment: In 1810, Verity Farmer served as one of the administrators of the estate of George Albritton Sr. of Burke County, Georgia, son of James Albritton Sr. The name *"Verity"* is almost exclusively a female name, but this person was a male. In 1830, Verity Farmer served as a grand juror for the Burke County Superior Court (see *"Constitutionalist"* (Augusta, GA), 14 May 1830, p. 1, column 4). This implies that Verity Farmer married a daughter of George Albritton Sr. Other records of Verity Farmer:

- registered for the 1805 Georgia Land Lottery from Burke County with only one draw, indicating a single man, or widowed without children
- registered for the 1807 Lottery from Burke, having two fortunate draws. This suggests Verity Farmer married between 1804 and 1807.
- Verity sold one of his land lots to Zachariah Albritton in 1812.
- Census records from Burke County, 1820–1840, show the household listed under the name of *"Verity Farmer"* included an older couple.

	• Newspaper records show that Verity Farmer lived in Burke County until about 1848 or 1849.

Comment:	Unlike the document made in 1798, this one clearly indicates that the elder Richard Albritton was making the purchase, while his great-nephew was the witness. It is not known who Sally Albritton was, but she was not the younger Richard's wife, as he had married in 1802 to Margaret Kent. It is unclear why the elder Richard would pay the small fee of \$3 for 200 acres of land.

A comparison with earlier Pitt County records clearly shows that they are children of Joel Albritton. Unfortunately, in <i>Albrittons of the Second Millennium</i> , the author misinterprets that document and lists an incorrect father for McGilbra F. Albritton (Albritton, pp. 127, 276–277).
